Open Session

Report by County Cllr Lake

In the absence of County Cllr Lake, the Clerk read his report: "I am so sorry but I have been called away to another meeting tonight. Very little to report, but with these high winds there has been considerable damage to trees alongside the roads in our parishes. Land owners are responsible for their maintenance not KCC. I still need to know whether children in Leigh are going to the school of their choice and whether they have been denied transport to their schools so that I can appeal on their behalf. I have put in a request for Leigh to join the KCC Highway Improvement Plan and Kent Highways will make contact shortly to agree a visit and a meeting with the Parish Council."

Closed Session

- 49. Apologies for absence** were received from Cllr Lake, Cllr Marchant and Cllr Smith and members accepted their reasons for absence. Apologies for absence were also received from County Cllr Lake and District Cllr Osborne-Jackson.
- 50. Declaration of Disclosable Pecuniary Interest / Non-Pecuniary Interest on matters to be discussed**
None.
- 51. The minutes of the Leigh Parish Council Meeting held on 3rd June 2019** were approved and duly signed. Proposed by Cllr Satterley, seconded by Cllr Britain, and all were in favour.
- 52. Planning**
- i. To consider applications received
 - i. SE/19/01438/LBCALT: 2 Forge Square, The Green, Leigh TN11 8QR - replacement of three windows to the rear elevation, one at first floor level and two at ground floor level. Members were concerned that the application includes the installation of UPVC windows on a listed building, which would not be in keeping with the age of the property.
 - ii. SE/19/01204/HOUSE and SE/19/01205/LBCALT: The Farmhouse, Home Farm, Hildenborough Road, Leigh TN11 8NA - replacement of existing Conservatory & Lobby with New Sun Room & Lobby on the same footprint. Members supported this application.
 - iii. SE/19/01600/AGRNOT: Coppings Farm, Coppings Road, Leigh TN11 8PN - replace a wooden agricultural building with a steel structured building. Members had no comment to make on this application.

ii. To report SDC planning application decisions

- SE/19/01448/AGRNOT: Land to the West of The Bungalow, Prices Wood, Tonbridge Road - new access and hardstanding/drop off pick up point for the Rain or Shine Forest Preschool for 4 mornings per week during term time only. Application refused. Officer's report states: the proposed works would not constitute as permitted development under the provisions of Schedule 2, Part 6, Class E, of the GPDO (as amended), as: (i) the development has already commenced; (ii) the development is not a private way and works would be within 25m of a metalled road; and (iii) works required for a non-forestry purpose.
- SE/19/01027/FUL: Meadow Bungalow, Powder Mill Lane, Leigh - demolition of existing detached timber bungalow and garage/outbuilding; construction of replacement single storey dwelling with basement and outbuilding. Application approved.
- SE/19/01214/MMA: 9 Home Farm Close, Leigh - Minor material amendment 18/02760/HOUSE. Application approved.
- SE/ 19/01222/LBCALT: 9 Home Farm Close, Leigh - proposed single storey extension and conversion of single attached garage to form utility room. Application approved.

iii. To report Appeal decisions

- Appeal A Ref: APP/G2245/W/18/3207553 Woodlands, Greenview Avenue, Leigh, Kent TN11 8QT. The application ref SE/18/00394/FUL, dated 5 February 2018, was refused by notice dated 29 March 2018. The development proposed was subdivision of the plot and erection of a new two bed detached dwelling.
- Appeal B Ref: APP/G2245/W/18/3210846 Woodlands, Greenview Avenue, Leigh, Kent TN11 8QT: The application ref SE/18/01779/FUL, dated 6 June 2018, was refused by notice dated 1 August 2018. The development proposed was subdivision of the plot and erection of a new two bed bungalow.

The harm of both proposals to the character and appearance of the location would significantly and demonstrably outweigh the very small social, economic and environmental benefits found. Therefore, neither appeal proposal would benefit from the presumption in favour of sustainable development and nor would the material considerations exist for either to be determined other than in accordance with development plan policy, with which in both cases there would be conflict. Both appeals have been dismissed and the application for costs against SDC has been refused.

53. The Green:

i. To discuss the refurbishment of the litter bins on The Green

In the absence of Cllr Marchant, the Clerk reported that Cllr Marchant has obtained prices for shot-blasting and etching the bins (£65-£75 + VAT each) and to shot-blast, etch and powdercoat/paint the bins (£200-£250 + VAT each). This will be one colour and additional colours, such as the gold crest, could be added afterwards. Members agreed to arrange for all the bins to be done, not all at once, but perhaps in pairs to ensure that there is not a litter problem whilst the work is being done.

ii. To hear update regarding parking on The Green

The Clerk reported that Alice's Ices and the Fish & Chip van have both reported a reduction in sales since the Parish Council asked them to move their sale location. Cllr Kaye gave approval on Thursday for both these vans to be allowed to park on The Green only in dry conditions until the end of the summer. If it is wet, both vans must park on the road. The Clerk reported that an email has been received from the Chair of Governors at Leigh School asking for the Parish Council to allow Alice's Ices to be allowed to park on The Green for safety reasons. The Clerk also reported that a resident phoned to say that by asking people not to park on The Green it is causing increased parking on roads off The Green. Members were sympathetic about this, but as the roads have no parking restrictions there is nothing that can be done.

iii. To consider whether to lay a small area of grasscrete to allow restricted parking on The Green for visiting food outlets only

Cllr Kaye proposed that an area of 20ft x 12ft of grasscrete should be laid on The Green opposite the school just to allow parking for visiting food outlets. The Clerk reported that Alice's Ices has offered to make a contribution of £150 towards this cost.

It is important that only one vehicle parks there at a time, therefore the two vans will need to discuss timing. It was agreed that R. Marchant & Sons Ltd be asked to provide a quote for this work at the September meeting.

iv. To discuss the Fun Fair

The Clerk reported that she asked for residents' comments in the parish magazine about whether the fun fair is supported locally. No comments received yet, and item to be discussed at the September Parish Council meeting. Members agreed that, although there was some damage to The Green due to the unusually wet conditions, the fun fair managed this as well as they could, and the grass has recovered.

v. To discuss the request by Lygne WI for a tree to be planted on The Green

The Clerk reported that the WI has requested that they plant a Jacquemontii Birch tree on The Green. Members approved, exact position to be agreed. The Clerk also reported that the WI has said that the two planters to be sited at both ends of the village are currently being made and should be in situ by mid-summer.

vi. Grass cuttings

The Clerk reported that she has been advised that someone has been leaving grass cuttings in the ditch by the Vicarage, which is clogging up the drainage. Members agreed that this is prohibited.

54. Charcott:

The repair or replacement of the oak posts around Charcott Green will be discussed at the September Parish Council meeting.

55. Powder Mills

Cllr Skipper reported that he has had various correspondence between Cllr Kaye and Steve Whitehead, Senior Planning Enforcement Officer at SDC, regarding the play area, communal areas and picnic area at Old Powder Mills development. The communal area has been closed by Bellway as the grass seed has not taken. They have employed a company to come and water the grass seed and another company to plant wildflowers. Over 20 residents have shown concern that the area is closed for the summer, the work is behind schedule and taking too long. Gateway Property Management has been appointed by Bellway for the wooded areas, communal areas and play area. They are very helpful and have a long list of actions and plans to improve and maintain the site. At present this does not include the picnic area and the area surrounding the play area as this will not be accepted by Gateway until Bellway have completed the re-seeding and maintained it to a satisfactory level. Therefore, if there are any issues with the play equipment or the play area ground or grass they should be now directed to Gateway. Anything in relation to the outer area of the picnic and surrounding area should be directed to Bellway. Cllr Skipper added that he met with Cllr Kaye and Cllr Marchant to look at the area and it was agreed that the Clerk should write to Bellway to ask them to replace the path, which is made of inappropriate sandy material that could be washed away and will deteriorate over time. Cllr Skipper also reported that D.Cllr Osborne-Jackson visited the site today and undertook to contact Bellway to ask that some debris and large stones are removed from the communal and play areas. Cllr Skipper said that there has also been a discussion about the designation of parking spaces as visitor only parking spaces by Bellway, and Cllr Osborne-Jackson has offered to look into this on behalf of the residents. Cllr Kaye thanked Cllr Skipper for his help on this issue, and reiterated that any issues with the development must be directed to SDC as the planning authority. The Parish Council is only a consultee on planning applications up to the date that the application is determined and is not responsible for enforcement issues.

56. Highways & Environment

i. To discuss the Leigh Expansion and Hildenborough Embankment Project

Cllr Britain declared a DPI in this item. The Clerk reported that she has emailed the Environment Agency with the resident's question and is awaiting a response. Separately, the Environment Agency has emailed to say: "The Environment Agency is proposing to increase the stored water level in the Leigh flood storage area during an event. To do this we need to request a change to a document under the Medway Flood Relief Act 1976. Your organisation is a key consultee for this change and I am writing to ask for your assistance in identifying a person within the Parish Council who can act as a single point of contact for our consultation.

“As you know, the Environment Agency is working with Kent County Council and Tonbridge and Malling Borough Council on a project to expand the capacity of the existing Leigh Flood Storage Area (FSA) so that the structure will be able to hold more flood water and reduce risk to more homes downstream. With climate change, we are likely to see more events like those experienced during the winter of 2013 and expanding the Leigh FSA will help us to be better prepared to manage these types of events. The operation of the existing FSA is governed by an Act of Parliament – the River Medway (Flood Relief) Act 1976. A document under this Act sets out a maximum water level during operation of 28.05 metres Above Ordnance Datum Newlyn (AODN). This means that under law, the Environment Agency cannot store water any higher than this level. In order to expand the FSA and store water to a higher level, the Environment Agency must formally consult on a new water level which will then require approval from the Floods Minister, Therese Coffey. I am writing to let you know Defra’s process for this consultation and ask what process the Parish Council will need to follow and the timescales for this. To be clear, this process is completely separate from the planning process which will run separately, with Tonbridge and Malling Borough Council leading the process. I would be grateful if the project team could meet with someone from the council to discuss this consultation and plan out the timescales needed for your input.” Members agreed that the Clerk should be the point of contact. Members said that the Parish Council needs to be satisfied that the proposals do not negatively impact Leigh or its residents. It was agreed that a working party be formed of Cllr Kaye, Cllr Britain and Cllr Croft and Clerk to arrange a meeting with the Environment Agency to discuss this in more detail. Cllr Britain’s DPI was discussed, and it was agreed that he could be included in discussions with the Environment Agency and stand on the working party, but he would be excluded from any vote made by the Parish Council.

ii. To discuss the repair of the front column of The Pump House

The Clerk reported that this has been completed.

iii. To discuss the repair of the drainage pipe on Scabharbour Road

The Clerk reported that the works to reinstate the dislodged pipework on Scabharbour Road has been programmed for this week. This may be subject to change depending on any emergency jobs that arise during that week.

iv. To discuss the Leigh Highways Improvement Plan

The Clerk reported that Highways are encouraging Town and Parish Councils to prepare a Highways Improvement Plan. “We want communities to have a greater voice in prioritising the road safety measures we need to take and to be more responsive to community needs. At the same time, we need to balance requests with the money we have available to spend, making sure our investment has the most impact in making roads safer for all users. Local communities are best-placed to tell us about the road safety issues in their areas and, through the collaboration between local members and parish and town councils, this can provide us with a clear view about the local priorities we should be addressing. The Highways Improvement Plan gives parish and town councils the opportunity to decide which community priorities they want to take forward. Given the finite KCC highways budget, not all priorities are likely to be funded. However, the Kent Highways team can discuss the problems and provide technical advice for the best way to deliver improvements and provide estimates for the costs. Using this information, parish and town councils can determine whether they can provide funding for these priorities and, working with Kent Highways, deliver them.

Benefits:

- Communities not only have a voice on the road safety improvements that are delivered in their areas, but they also have control over determining these and taking them forward
- There is greater transparency of road safety improvements in local areas through local Highways Improvement Plans
- Highways, members and parish/town councils have a more productive relationship
- Highways staff have more time to work proactively with local communities in delivering these improvements.”

It was agreed to consider this and discuss at the September Parish Council meeting. Possible items to be included: speed reduction High Street and Powder Mill Lane, improvements to drainage in Coppings Road, replacement of anti-skid surface at Laundry corner, improvements to drainage on Powder Mill Lane near the bend, width of the road on Powder Mill Lane between the bus shelter and The Green.

- v. To discuss the classification of site to the south of Lealands Avenue as a Kent Local Wildlife Site
The Clerk reported that a new draft Local Wildlife Site has been proposed by Kent Wildlife Trust. This is to the south of Lealands Avenue, and along the railway embankment towards the A21. The reason for designation is that the site is an extensive area of damp, tall, herb fen and ditches with a range of uncommon wetland plants, wet woodland and neutral grassland. Members supported this proposal.
- vi. To discuss Leigh in Bloom
 - i. The Clerk reported that a resident has asked that wild meadow seeds are sown on the triangle of The Green near Porcupine House and also on the land opposite the substation at the bottom of Church Hill. Members said that they have considered this in the past and it was not supported because although, in theory, the idea to have beautiful wild flowers during the summer is good, in reality, this would be very hard to keep looking nice. There is an awful lot of hard work involved, the weeds which would inevitably grow would need removing or they would choke the flowers. Very soon the area could become an overgrown straggly mess if it's not constantly tended. Safety is of paramount importance and any loss of visibility for pedestrians, cyclists or drivers is a concern. The suggestion of wild meadow seeds at the bottom of Church Hill was also discussed but the Parish Council had the same concerns, plus the access to the substation is required at all times. Members said that they understand and appreciate the resident's thoughts, however, and suggested that the resident prepares a plan as to how the area would be created and maintained to a sufficient standard, and who would be responsible for this work. Clerk to advise that the Parish Council does not support the idea of The Green being planted with wild meadow seeds, but one area that could work is the verge on the right of the drive down from the road to the church. Any suggestions would need to be discussed first with the owners of Park House and Porcupine House. Item to be discussed again in September.
 - ii. The Clerk reported that the same resident has asked that the roadside verges be allowed to grow, but members agreed that this is not possible. The Parish Council has a contract to cut the verges three times a year for safety reasons. If the roadside verges are allowed to grow, it reduces visibility for all road users, and cars are forced into the middle of the road. Potholes are obscured from view so there is also the risk of damage to cars.
 - iii. There has been a request for a new planter where the old phone box was located. Members approved this request providing the planter is well cared for.
 - iv. A complaint has been received regarding weedkilling at the end of Church Hill. Members felt that this must be to do with the access to the substation, which must be accessible at all times.
- vii. To discuss the Leigh Neighbourhood Watch Scheme
Cllr Satterley asked whether there are any Neighbourhood Watch schemes in Leigh? The Clerk reported that she has asked for information on this but it had yet to be received. Item to be discussed in September.

57. Rights of Way

To discuss the maintenance of SR416 across the airfield in Chiddingstone Causeway

Cllr Croft reported that he cut the vegetation on this path, and members asked that this is done each year early in the season before the vegetation has a chance to grow too high. Cllr Kaye reported that KCC has advised that the vegetation cuts on Leigh ROW will be done soon.

58. To discuss projects at Leigh Station to be funded by Govia Thameslink Railway

Members suggested that either some more seating or an additional covered area on the platforms would be beneficial. Clerk to report to D.Cllr Osborne-Jackson.

59. To discuss the possible refurbishment of the Leigh Cricket Pavilion

Cllr Kaye reported that he and Cllr Satterley met representatives of the Cricket Club to discuss the pavilion, and the Cricket Club is in favour of moving the project forward. Cllr Kaye, Cllr Satterley, Cllr Rogers and a resident have arranged to meet and consider how this can be progressed. It was agreed that transparency is important.

60. Affordable Housing:

- i. The Clerk updated the Parish Council with the current situation regarding the Leigh site search.
- ii. The Clerk reported that an email has been received from Gavin Missons, Housing Policy Manager at SDC: “we have several new shared-ownership units complete and up for sale in Oakley Park, Edenbridge and other areas within the District - plus more will be coming our way through 2019 and beyond. Marketing is being targeted at and priority given to those with a live and/or work connection to the District in the early stages. If you are interested, go to the ‘Help to Buy’ website and search ‘Sevenoaks’ for all currently available properties: www.helptobuyese.org.uk. Details on qualifying criteria and online application forms can also be found at: www.helptobuyese.org.uk/help-to-buy/shared-ownership. Our partner housing associations have a panel of trusted local financial advisors able to help explore mortgage products and assess suitability etc., and can offer that service to help you through the process.”

61. Aviation

The Clerk reported that the HWCAAG will hopefully be arranging a meeting in September with Baroness Vere (the Parliamentary Under-Secretary of State for Transport), Martin Rolfe (CEO of NATS), Stewart Wingate (Chief Executive of GAL), Tom Tugendhat, the AEF plus representatives from the community groups: GON, GACC, CAGNE.

62. Aged Persons Dwellings

In the absence of Cllr Marchant, the Clerk reported that he has advised that the repair to the path at No.2 The Bungalows is in hand.

63. To discuss the Family Fun play events on The Green 2019

The Clerk reported that the summer holiday event will be held on Friday 23rd August from 10am to 2pm on The Green. The Circus Workshop has now been booked.

64. To report on correspondence received

The Clerk reported that lists of correspondence received have been circulated, and drew members’ attention to the following:

- i. Item 2: Email from Tom Tugendhat: “Though disruption on the railway is an almost daily occurrence with Southern, last year you might remember just how bad it was, which co-coincided with the introduction of Thameslink services elsewhere. As a result of this Govia Thameslink Railway, Southern’s parent company, have agreed to contribute £15 million towards a Passenger Benefit Fund which can be spent on schemes at either a local station level such as additional seats, cycle racks of waiting shelters, or for the wider passenger benefit such as improvements to the GTR app or longer toilet opening hours at stations. With six stations on two different lines across our area, I want to make sure that we can ensure that as much of this money is spent on the projects locally as possible, and that other improvements they will propose will make a difference across the network too. I have set up a survey to get your views and those of others who rely on southern services. You can find it at www.surveymonkey.com/r/SouthernBenefitFund. I’ll use the responses from this to base the projects which I will be pushing for funding for.”
- ii. Item 3: ACRK/SDC – free advice service for rural retailers.
- iii. Item 4: Kent Police: The Office of the Police & Crime Commissioner (PCC) is looking for volunteers (Independent Custody Visitors – ICVs) across Kent to visit Custody suites to check on the welfare and conditions of those held in police cells and report back to the PCC. The time commitment required is around three to five hours a month and all ICVs are asked to carry out at least one night-time visit a year. The PCC’s recruitment drive closes on 1st July. More information about ICVs, and the application form, can be found here: <https://kent-pcc.gov.uk/what-we-do/holding-kent-police-to-account/independent-custody-visitors>
- iv. Item 5: KALC Sevenoaks Branch –notification that the next two meetings in 2019 will be Fridays 30th August and 29th November, and enclose minutes of the meeting held on 21st June.
- v. Item 6: SDC News Releases (i) A Sevenoaks resident has pleaded guilty to fly-tipping in Riverhead following an investigation by SDC. 29 year old Brendan Dewberry of Whitley Woodworks, Whitley Farm, Sevenoaks was fined £1,745, including court costs, at Sevenoaks Magistrates’ Court.

SDC is the only local authority in Kent to have a dedicated fly-tipping investigation team who will take a zero tolerance approach and bring fly-tippers to justice. Residents can report fly-tipping on public land and on the highway by calling Sevenoaks District Council on 01732 227000.

(ii) The Try Angle Awards this year celebrates its 25th anniversary recognizing the efforts and achievements of young people and groups in our community who really TRY their best aged 11-18 years old (up to 25 years recognizing special needs and disabilities).

- vi. Item 7: High Weald AONB Unit: The High Weald AONB Partnership, which includes the 15 local planning authorities with land in the AONB, has drafted a Design Guide for new housing development in the High Weald. Once adopted, the Guide will be a material consideration in the determining of planning applications within the High Weald AONB. The Design Guide gives succinct, practical and consistent advice on design expectations for new housing development within the High Weald AONB. This will enable higher quality and landscape-led design that reflects intrinsic High Weald character and is embedded with a true sense of place, without stifling innovation and creativity. See www.highweald.org/look-after/planning/design-guide-consultation. The Design Guide is the subject of an eight-week period of formal public consultation from Wednesday 19 June until Wednesday 14 August 2019.
- vii. Item 8: Response from Peter Clifton, Technical Manager at Bellway, regarding the removal of the yellow highway signs: “The yellow signs you mention, do they say “Old Powder Mills” or “1811” – if it’s the former, I have given the instruction for them to be removed if it’s the latter, these are our sales ones, which our sales department usually leave up for about a year after the last plot is sold to ensure people can find the site until mapping systems are updated. In either case, sometimes they do miss one, if they do, then please let me know. If it is “Old Powder Mills” I’ll sort it as soon as possible.”
- viii. Item 10: SDC: notification that John Edwards-Winsor has been elected as Chairman of SDC for the year 2019/20 and Diana Esler has been elected Vice-Chairman. Peter Fleming has been re-elected as Leader of the Council for the next four years.
There are now 6 members of Cabinet with 6 Advisory Committees, rather than the previous 7. The portfolios and corresponding advisory committees are Improvement & Innovation, Cleaner & Greener, Development & Conservation, Finance & Investment, Housing & Health and People & Places.
