MINUTES OF THE LEIGH PARISH COUNCIL MEETING HELD IN THE SMALL HALL, HIGH STREET, LEIGH ON MONDAY 5TH NOVEMBER 2018 AT 8.00PM

IN ATTENDANCE: Mrs L. Kleinschmidt (Clerk). County and District Cllr Lake and member of the public attended the meeting for the Open Session only.

Open Session

Public Session

Mr Derek Furneaux attended the meeting in order to discuss the Football Club's application for a grant towards machinery to manage the football pitch on The Green. He said that the works carried out by the Parish Council to The Green hopefully will allow the club to play on the pitch more often this year. Derek said that he donated his ride on mower to the Football Club with the proviso that any organisation that needs to use it can do so when required. He has received a quote of £950 to repair and service the machine. In addition, the club needs to purchase a few add-on items to ensure that the pitch is a level playing surface. These cost £490. Both prices include VAT. Derek said that he has seeded the bare patches on The Green, where the grass seed didn't take due to the dry hot conditions experienced this summer.

Report by County and District Cllr Lake

County Cllr Lake reported as follows:

- i. Julian Cook is temporarily leaving KCC Highways to work on vehicle related Brexit matters, and Mike Payton will take over as Sevenoaks District Manager. C.Cllr Lake said that he will bring Mike to Leigh soon so that he can see the highways issues. He has also contacted Geoff Bineham and asked him to meet him and the Clerk in Powder Mills to look at the roads in that area.
- ii. C.Cllr Lake, the Clerk and Cllr Britain met the KCC Landscape Officer at the hedge in Well Close. There are 49 trees that need removing and the officer will be discussing what budget is available for this project with her manager.
- iii. The retrospective application for the siting of a portacabin at Manor Buildings was refused and the SDC Enforcement Officer has placed an order for the portacabin to be removed and disposed of.
- iv. The public inquiry regarding Manor Buildings has been the subject of discussion with KCC lawyers, in particular whether C.Cllr Lake can speak at the inquiry.
- v. C.Cllr Lake advised that he has had two appeals from families regarding transport to schools, the two children concerned are going to Judd School but KCC say that their nearest appropriate school is Hayesbrook. These two cases were won on appeal. Overcrowding on school buses continues to be a worry, and there is a meeting on Friday with KCC and the district/borough councils to decide how to rectify this problem.
- vi. Gatwick Airport Ltd is now proposing to use its emergency runway as a second runway. Wet Kent members of KCC are opposed to this proposal and will be objecting to this strongly as it would be dangerous with too many aircraft taking off and arriving at the airport. There would also be a knock-on effect on vehicular traffic as the road infrastructure would not be able to cope.

Cllr Marchant reported that Leigh Church may be contacting C.Cllr Lake regarding a grant application to improve disabled access to the church.

(County and District Cllr Lake left the meeting at 8.30pm)

Closed Session

101. Apologies for absence were received from Cllr Satterley and members accepted his reason for absence.

- 102. Declaration of Disclosable Pecuniary Interest / Non-Pecuniary Interest on matters to be discussed**
None.
- 103. The minutes of the Leigh Parish Council Meeting held on 1st October 2018** were approved and duly signed. Proposed by Cllr Croft, seconded by Cllr Johnston, and all were in favour.
- 104. Planning**
- i. To consider applications received
 - i. SE/18/02369/HOUSE: 2 Blackhoath Cottages, Tonbridge Road, Leigh TN11 8HS - demolition of existing garage and replace with a new green oak timber barn style building. Members supported this application.
The Clerk reported that since the last meeting, the Planning Committee met and agreed comments to the following planning applications:
 - ii. SE/18/03046/HOUSE: Fairlawns, Tonbridge Road, Leigh TN11 8HP - replacement of front porch and raising front roof pitch, rendering of external brickwork and changing roof tiles, alterations to fenestration. Landscaping works. Members supported this application.
 - iii. Pippin Cottage, The Green, Leigh TN11 8QJ - partial demolition of wall and erection of single storey rear extension. Alterations to fenestration. Members supported this application.
 - ii. To report SDC planning application decisions
 - SE/18/02555/HOUSE: 7 Meadow Bank, Leigh - two storey side extension with loft conversion and single storey rear extension. Application approved.
 - SE/18/02782/FUL: Manor Buildings, Powder Mill Lane, Leigh TN11 9AS - Portacabin unit. Application refused. Reason: "The portacabin would increase the amount of the built form on the site, harmful to the openness of the Green Belt. As such, the development is inappropriate development in the Green Belt by definition and would harm the openness of the Green Belt which is defined as freedom from built form. The development would fail to comply with the National Planning Policy Framework and very special circumstances do not exist in this case which would clearly outweigh these harms."
 - SE/18/01951/HOUSE and SE/18/01952/LBCALT: Orchard House, High Street, Leigh - proposed loft conversion including a new staircase, and three dormer windows. Application withdrawn.
 - SE/18/03151/WTCA: Pippin Cottage, The Green, Leigh - Yew tree: lift crown to approximately 4 ft (1.2m). T2 - Pencil Cypress and the dead one to its left: fell to ground level. T3 - Leaning Spruce: dismantle and fell to ground level. SDC had no objection to this application.
 - iii. To discuss the Public Inquiry regarding Manor Buildings
Public Inquiry is on 13th November at 10am at SDC offices.
- 105. To discuss SDC's report and recommendations regarding Leigh's Conservation Area**
The Clerk reported that SDC has completed its review of the Leigh Conservation Area Appraisals, and has finalised a draft of the new Conservation Area Appraisal which is now subject to public consultation. The consultation will run until 5pm on Friday 30th November 2018. Further information and a link to the revised documents can be found via: <https://www.sevenoaks.gov.uk/conservationareas>. This also includes a link to the online questionnaire. Hard copies of the Conservation Area Appraisal are made available for viewing at SDC offices, Sevenoaks Library and the Leigh Village Shop. All residents and businesses in the Conservation Area will receive a consultation leaflet informing them about the consultation. SDC will be holding a public consultation event in the Fleur-de-Lis Public House on Saturday 17 November from 10.30am to 1pm where residents and stakeholders can meet the project team for further information and any queries. The Clerk reported that the proposed change incorporates the inclusion of Garden Cottages in the new Conservation Area boundary. Members asked the Clerk to inform SDC that their map is out of date as there is now a new dwelling on Powder Mill Lane that is not shown on the map. Members agreed to support the review and recommendations for extending the Conservation Area.
- 106. The Green:**
- i. To discuss inspections of veteran oak tree and work carried out

Bartletts Consultants Report - October 2015: Recommendations:

1. Reduce crown in height by approximately 1.5-2m and lateral spread to the north, east and south also by approximately 1.5-2m using drop crotching back to suitable secondary growth points.
2. Reduce lateral spread of crown to the west by between 2-3m to maintain balance using drop crotching back to suitable secondary growth points.
3. Remove deadwood from crown.
4. During reduction works, inspect the installed cabling, report any defectiveness and make necessary adjustments.
5. Install a guying system.
6. Access beneath the tree should be discouraged:
 - i. Remove all furniture, such as benches and bins located within 15m of tree
 - ii. Install a fence and lay arisings from the crown reduction works at the boundary of The Green and the road and, in addition, plant a hedge of specimens with sharp foliage amongst fence or arisings.
 - iii. Lay arisings from crown reduction work to form a crescent on The Green with a diameter of approximately 15m and plant a hedge of specimens with sharp foliage amongst fence or arisings.
 - iv. Prevent parking of cars beneath crown of tree.
7. The tree will require annual inspections during late summer to re-assess risk and monitor health and condition.

Bartletts Consulting also recommended the following treatments:

1. Take soil samples in the root zone and carry out laboratory testing to establish macro and micro-nutrient levels.
2. Soil amelioration, including biochar to the root-zone out to the drip-line to balance the nutrient levels in order to improve conditions for the tree to thrive.
3. Apply phosphites to the soil to promote strong root growth to counteract the effect of the decay pathogen.
4. Install a mulch crescent 50-100mm thick out to the drip-line of the reduced crown, to retain moisture, reduce competition and to in time promote de-compaction of the underlying soil.

Bartletts – work completed September 2016

Prune Oak (ID# T1) located at the green according to the following specifications:

- Clean to remove all dead, diseased and broken branches 2 centimetres in diameter and larger throughout crown to improve health and appearance and reduce risk of branch failure.
- Reduce crown height by approx. 1.5-2.0 meters and lateral spread to the north, east and south by approx. 1.5-2.0 meters, using 'drop crotching' back to growth secondary growth points.
- Reduce the lateral spread of the crown to the west by between 2.0 and 3.0 meters to maintain balance, again using 'drop crotching' back to suitable secondary growth points.
- During reduction works inspect the installed cabling, report any defects and make any necessary adjustments.

Bartletts – work completed February 2017

Root invigoration: to cultivate the soil beneath the tree using an Air-Spade to improve soil health and promote root development. A radius of approximately 5m. from the trunk will be cultivated to a depth of 6-8cm. The soil should be irrigated regularly following treatment to keep soil moist if adequate rainfall does not occur. Biochar will be added to the soil, and mulch will be applied to an approximate depth of 1-4 inches to the treated area following cultivation.

Original Tree Surgeons – work completed May 2017

Bob Noakes from OTS Kent (Original Tree Surgeons) has inspected the veteran oak tree on The Green, and has recommended that, in order to reduce the risk of branch failure and to preserve the oak tree in its present form for as long as possible, the following is carried out: (i) to carry out a climbing inspection to check existing cables. One cable is obviously slack so instead of tightening this, replace this one with a non-invasive Cobra bracing system. (ii) to put in place two markers down the trunk to enable the gap to be measured and to monitor any movement over the next eight weeks, taking measurements every two weeks. Ultimately, once the risk is too great, the tree's crown will have to be reduced in size but the aim is to avoid that for as long as possible.

Original Tree Surgeons - January 2018

Bob Noakes from OTS Ltd has emailed to say: "Just before Christmas 2017 we re-inspected the veteran Oak on The Green in Leigh to measure the width of the split. The gap is now less than when we first measured it due to the tree having no leaves. There is less weight and stress on the split. The great news is that it has not got any worse than when we first measured it. In spring once it is in leaf again we will measure the gap and compare our findings. At this stage though all looks good."

The Clerk suggested that the annual inspection of all trees is now due, and members asked the Clerk to arrange this with Original Tree Surgeons, the last inspection was done in December 2017.

- ii. To discuss the possible installation of a low fence to protect the area under the veteran oak tree and prevent car parking

The Clerk reported that she has met Weld Done at the tree and discussed estate fencing, and a quote has been prepared to supply and fit approximately 32m of estate railing to go around the Oak tree. All metalwork to be undercoated and painted black.

Option 1 – to be 1m high with a top bar being 20mm round; to then have 3 lower flat bars;

Option 2 – to be 1.1m high with a top bar being 20mm round; to then have 4 lower flat bars.

Members asked the Clerk to obtain a quote for hooped metal as an alternative. Item to be discussed at the next meeting.

- iii. To discuss the refurbishment of the litter bins on The Green

Cllr Marchant reported that he removed the seat and the litter bin under the veteran oak tree, and is in the process of obtaining a price for sand blasting the litter bin and re-painting it. To be discussed at the next meeting.

- iv. To discuss the refurbishment of the Leigh village sign

Members agreed that the sign looks to be in good condition. No further action required at the present time.

- v. To consider Lyghe Women's Institute suggestion of a Pin Oak to be planted on The Green

The Clerk reported that the WI has asked for a Pin Oak to be planted on The Green by the Vicarage as part of their centenary celebrations. Members did not approve this request as this is a fast growing tree that can grow very big. Members said that they would consider a smaller (maximum 30ft) native tree that would thrive on wet soil.

107. Charcott:

None.

108. Powder Mills

- i. To discuss highway issues in connection with the Old Powder Mills development

The Clerk reported that patching work has been undertaken on Powder Mill Lane.

- ii. To hear update on Bellway's request to KCC for some double yellow lines on Burton Avenue

The Clerk reported that Bellway have now collated all responses, and have requested a meeting with Kent County Council to discuss the response and agree the next step in the process. The Clerk advised that she asked that the Parish Council be included in this meeting, but was told that this would not be appropriate at this early stage.

- iii. To discuss speed limits on roads surrounding Old Powder Mills

The Clerk reported that she has requested speed tests to be carried out by our PCSOs. The equipment is currently being repaired, but the PCSO has added the Parish Council to their list of sites to be tested. The Clerk has asked County Cllr Peter Lake to arrange a meeting with Geoff Bineham to look at the speeds in the Powder Mills area.

109. Highways & Environment

- i. To discuss the hedge at Well Close

The Clerk reported that a meeting was held this morning with Rebecca Morgan of KCC, Cllr Britain and County Cllr Lake. Rebecca says that she estimates that it will cost £7000 to remove the trees and kill the roots off with an environmentally friendly phosphorous pesticide. She then suggests re-planting with Yew or Beech, and undertook to speak to her manager regarding available budget. If budget available she is keen to get the work done this autumn. These are the trees adjacent to the road that were cut back sharply. There is a short stretch of trees not yet cut back and not in KCC's

ownership. Members agreed to wait and see what KCC proposes before making a decision on these trees.

- ii. To discuss the rotten post on the western corner of The Pump House
Cllr Marchant undertook to have a look and consider whether a new post could be erected.
- iii. To consider Lyghe Women's Institute's request for two planters to be placed on Hildenborough Road
The WI has asked for permission to purchase, plant and maintain two planters on Hildenborough Road, one by the village gateway near Gibbs Field, and one at the top of Penshurst Road. Members were very supportive of this proposal and gave their approval.
- iv. To discuss the Bulk Refuse Freighter visit on 1st December
The Clerk reminded members that the freighter will stop in Crandalls between 12.45pm and 1.30pm.

110. Rights of Way

None.

111. To discuss the possible refurbishment of the Leigh Cricket Pavilion

None.

112. To discuss events to commemorate the centenary of World War 1 and approve costs and risk assessment

Cllr Kaye reported that, following approval during the month via email, plans for the beacon event are well in hand. The Royal British Legion will apply for a temporary events notice in order to supply alcohol, and a barbeque will be provided. Advertising boards were ordered and have been erected, leaflets have been printed and distributed in the parish. Hever Landscapes have provided a quote of £194 + VAT to lift 5m x 5m turf and store locally, and to relay after the event. This includes the hire of a turf cutter. Cllr Marchant proposed that this quote be accepted, this was seconded by Cllr Smith and all were in favour. Members also approved the risk assessment. Cllr Kaye advised that Peter Fleming, Leader of SDC, will attend.

113. Affordable Housing

- i. To hear update regarding the Leigh Affordable Housing scheme
The Clerk updated the Parish Council with the current situation regarding the site search.
- ii. To consider launching a Call for Sites
The Clerk reported that a new site has been raised by SDC – the garages behind Old Orchard in Charcott. This site was discarded by the new Local Plan as it's too small – less than 5 units. The Parish Council objected to the inclusion of this site as it would remove residents' garages and parking area. ERHA has looked at it and has now told SDC that they are not in favour of taking this forward for the same reasons. Members considered whether it would be useful carrying out a call for sites, but felt that they do not think it would be beneficial.

114. Aviation:

To hear report of the High Weald Councils Aviation Action Group

Cllr Stratton-Brown reported that Gatwick has launched a consultation on its new Master Plan. This includes the proposal to use their emergency runway which is 190m north of the existing main runway. There is a legal agreement in place that expires in August 2019 that says that this emergency runway should not be used as a main runway. GAL is proposing to build an extension to this emergency runway which would move the centre line north as it is currently too close to the existing main runway. GAL say that the use of this runway will only be for take-offs but it will obviously increase the number of landings and air traffic movements over time.

- Without the additional runway, GAL estimate that the number of passengers will increase by 15.5% between now and 2022/23, the average number of passengers per aircraft by 8% giving an increase in flights of 7%.
- With the use of the emergency runway as a second runway, the number of passengers will increase by 51%, the average number of passengers per aircraft by 11% giving an increase in flights of 36%.

GAL says that it can do this without increasing its noise impact. The noise contour is likely to move however. There will be an increase in overflight of 20-30%. This new runway, if approved, could be operational in five years' time.

The proposal fits within the current Government policy as it would use existing assets and it would be within the existing airport boundary. There will be a huge impact on local infrastructure, housing, health and education services. The proposal is more credible than GAL's proposal for a second runway. The HWCAAG will be pushing Government for increased compensation scheme and for this to be pushed out to cover an area further away – currently as far as Lingfield. There is an aviation strategy green paper to be published in December, and this will include context on compensation as it is an important issue. There are exhibitions as part of the public consultation on GAL's master plan, the nearest is in Royal Victoria Place Shopping Centre, Tunbridge Wells on Saturday 10 November between 11am and 5pm.

Cllr Stratton-Brown reported that he attended a meeting organised by GACC for the Community Groups at which it was agreed that GACC would lead in the battle with Gatwick. GACC hopes to be able to hand attendees at the exhibitions a suggested response. GACC is also going to prepare a draft leaflet which could be distributed to every house in the Parish and a suggested response to the questionnaire. Cllr Stratton-Brown said that it is very important that residents object to this proposal as the impact on Leigh is likely to be extreme.

117. To report on correspondence received

The Clerk reported that lists of correspondence received have been circulated, and drew members' attention to the following:

- i. Item 2: NHS West Kent Clinical Commissioning Group: From 1st October 2018, people can book evening, weekend and bank holiday appointments with GPs, nurses and other health professionals in west Kent. This is part of a national drive to improve access to GP services and give people the opportunity to have an appointment at a time that suits them. The extra appointments service, alongside existing services, will allow people in west Kent to make an appointment to see a doctor between 8am and 8pm Monday to Friday and on Saturdays, Sundays and bank holidays. Appointments can be pre-booked for routine matters or at short notice for less routine needs. In addition, extra appointments with nurses and other health professionals will be available in the evenings and on Saturdays. New appointments may not always be provided at patients' own GP practices, but the health professionals treating them will be able to see their full medical records, with their consent. "We know that sometimes people have a long wait to see a their doctor and we believe the new longer hours service will be of particular help to commuters, parents with young families, and other people who find it difficult to get to their practice during normal working hours," said Dr Bob Bowes, chair of NHS West Kent Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG). "Anyone wanting to make an appointment should contact their GP practice in the first instance. Our trained staff will make sure they see the right doctor or healthcare professional at a time that suits them - either in their own surgery or, if not available there, at a surgery in west Kent that does. Anyone wanting to make an appointment must phone their own GP surgery and speak to the receptionist, who will offer the new appointments routinely, but do tell them if you particularly need a weekend or evening slot."
- ii. Item 3: KALC: Strategic Plan 2015-25, Annual Report 2017-18, invitation to their AGM on Saturday 17th November at Ditton Community Centre 9.30am to 2.00pm.
- iii. Item 4: Sevenoaks District Council's Cabinet has given the go ahead to invest £60,000 to take forward the restoration and improvement of Bradbourne Lakes.
- iv. Item 6: CAB Edenbridge – invitation to their AGM on Friday 9th November at 1.30pm in the Eden Centre. Tom Tugendhat will attend.
- v. Item 7: ACRK: invitation to the 95th Annual Meeting of Action with Communities in Rural Kent on Tuesday 13th November 2018 and also the nomination for election on the trustee board.
- vi. Item 8: KALC: Highways England has launched a consultation on its updated proposals for the Lower Thames Crossing. On the south side of the Thames, the proposed new road will link to the A2 and M2. On the north side, it will link the A13 and the M25.

The Highways England consultation deadline is 23:59 on 20 December 2018. Further details on the consultation and supporting documents can be found at <https://highwaysengland.citizenspace.com/ltc/consultation>. Highway England is running public information events in Kent and Essex over the coming weeks.

- vii. Item 9: SDC News Release: Have your say on conservation areas across Sevenoaks District: Residents are being asked to give their thoughts and opinions on the revised Conservation Area appraisals for Brasted High Street, Leigh, Seal, Shoreham and Swanley Village as a six week consultation opens on Friday 19 October. A conservation area is an area of special architectural or historic interest, the character or appearance of which it is desirable to preserve or enhance. Once finalised, Conservation Area appraisals provide everyone involved in the planning process with a framework against which future planning applications in a Conservation Area can be assessed and determined. Email submissions can also be made by contacting conservation@sevenoaks.gov.uk. The deadline to comment on the proposals is 5pm on Friday 30 November 2018. Consultation events are taking place and the Leigh one is on Saturday 17th November in the Fleur Public House.
- viii. Item 11: Email from Julian Cook, KCC Highways: "As winter approaches, I am just writing to offer the parishes the chance to have a one tonne bag of salt / sand mix that we can deliver and parishes can use on the public highway." Members did not want a bag this year.
- ix. Item 12: Kent County Council is currently consulting on its proposed budget for 2019/2020. The consultation closes on 21 November 2018. KCC estimates that increased demands and costs will amount to about £66 million, which together with net grant reductions of £28 million result in the need to raise and/or save £94 million. The consultation explains that "Increasing council tax by just under 3% plus the 2% social care levy would raise £37 million, and the remainder would need to be found from making savings and already planned but limited use of reserves. At this stage the council is still to identify detailed plans for around £16 million pending the Chancellor's budget and local government settlement. Taken together, the proposed changes would add just over £1 per week to the KCC element of the council tax bill for a typical Band C property." Further details on the KCC consultation and supporting documents can be accessed at www.kent.gov.uk/budget.
- x. Item 14: Email from Dan Eaton at Leigh Primary School with a copy of a letter from Ofsted: "Following my visit to the school on 2 October 2018, I write on behalf of Her Majesty's Chief Inspector of Education, Children's Services and Skills to report the inspection findings. The visit was the first short inspection carried out since the school was judged to be good in October 2014. This school continues to be good. The leadership team has maintained the good quality of education in the school since the last inspection. Based on the evidence gathered during this short inspection, I am of the opinion that the school has demonstrated strong practice and marked improvement in specific areas. This may indicate that the school has improved significantly overall. Therefore, I am recommending that the school's next inspection will be a section 5 inspection."
- xi. Item 15: Email from a resident of Burton Avenue regarding gritting Burton Avenue in icy conditions. Cllr Skipper advised that other residents in Old Powder Mills do not want Burton Avenue to be gritted. Members thought that a compromise would be a grit bin.
- xii. Item 16: KALC: Effective Higher Level Planning For Local Councils on Friday 7th December 2018 6:30pm to 9.30pm at Lenham Community Centre ME17 2QT. This is suitable for those members who attended the Hever Introduction to Planning event. Cost £60 + VAT per delegate.

118. To adopt the 2019 KALC Community Awards Scheme

Members adopted the KALC Community Awards Scheme for 2019 and nominations to be discussed at the next meeting.

119. Finance:

- i. To consider request for grant by Leigh Football Club for machinery to maintain The Green
See Open Session above. Cllr Stratton-Brown proposed that the Parish Council give a contribution of half the overall amount of the machinery and service. This was seconded by Cllr Skipper and all were in favour.

ii. To approve list of payments

Cllr Stratton-Brown proposed that the list of payments be approved. This was seconded by Cllr Marchant and all were in favour. Cllr Kaye and Cllr Britain undertook to authorise the online payments, and Cllr Smith and Cllr Skipper signed the list of payments.

120. Items for reporting or inclusion in future agenda

Cllr Marchant reported that directional signs to Glaxo Smith Kline are still located at the end of Rings Hill and should be removed.
